Stockton, the metropolis of the great San Joaquin Valley, is ready to roll out the Red Carpet for some 1500 delegates, members, and their families that are expected to crowd in Stockton's Civic Auditorium, Saturday and Sunday, March 23-24 for 22nd Annual Conference of the Northern California Council of AA.

Aside from a score of last minute finishing touches, the hardworking host committee has everything in readiness for which Bill G., NCC secretary said, "Present plans and programming give high promise that the 22nd Conference will go down in AA archives as the apex of AA activities in Northern California for 1968".

He is survived by his wife; three daughters; 2 sisters; 2 brothers; 7 grandchildren; and 5 great grandchildren.


Need Speakers?
