INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION - 1980

It is estimated that more than 30,000 persons will attend the 45th Anniversary International AA Convention in New Orleans July 3-6, 1980. This will be the largest gathering of its kind ever held anywhere in the world. Meeting concurrently will be Al-Anon and Alateen. The Hyatt-Regency is AA's head-quarters; the Hilton and Rivergate Center for Al-Anon and Alateen.

The Convention opens Thursday night, July 3, with a giant Mardi Gras parade in the Rivergate Convention Center. This will be followed by a get-acquain Ball featuring New Orleans jazz and a special young people's "Crayfish Cray at the Marriott Hotel.

On Friday and Saturday, July 4 and 5, a variety of alkathons, workshops, padiscussions and special interest meetings are scheduled from 8 AM to 2 PM the next day. Among the alkathons will be the Pacific Regional Alkathon, headed up by George D. Pacific Regional Trustee, and featuring speakers from Hawaii, Alaska, and Nevada. Among participants from Northern California in the workshop panels will be Dean K, past-delegate, Oakland, on Cooperation with the Professional Community, and Trisha G., Novato, on the Grapevine panel. Participating in the all-California alkathon will be Frank P, San Mateo. There will be a total of 170 meetings with participation by 510 speakers. One marathon will run 24 hours a day. The Superdome and Rivergate Convention Center will be the sites for many of the meetings but ballrooms local hotels also will be used for meetings.

On Friday, July 4, the Superdome will host the largest AA meeting ever hel Speakers will be AA members from Springfield, Mass., Arlington, Va., and Johannesburg, So. Africa. Giant TV screens are strategically located throu out the auditorium so that all will be able to see and hear. On Saturday t Convention will present its Big Show in the Superdome. This will feature t New Christy Minstrels, the Olympic Marching Band, the Harmonicats, and comedian Glen Ashe. Sunday morning will conclude with the big Spiritual Meeting in the Superdome. Lois Wilson will be present. Speakers will be fr Winnepeg, Los Angeles, and London.

30TH GENERAL SERVICE CONFERENCE

The 30th annual meeting of the General Service Conference of A.A. (U.S. and Canada), held April 20-26, began with a keynote address, "Participation: The Key to Recovery", by retiring trustee Cecil ("Cec") C., Prince Albert, Sask One of the chief effects of Conference Advisory Action this year was a recomendation that A.A. literature, published by AA World Services, Inc., still will be "Conference approved" by tested methods used over many years. However Guidelines and other such service materials from GSO (used chiefly to answer questions asked over and over) will continue to be produced without undergoing the long and often difficult procedures needed for Conference approvated Although the monthly issues of the AA Grapevine are not, themselves, Conference approved, the concept of the Grapevine has been approved by this body. Highlights of Conference proceedings included:

Agenda- Recommended that the theme for the 1981 Conference be built around "AA" Takes its Inventory - General Service Conference Structure"; and that there be a "What's On Your Mind" session for the full Conference.

Cooperation with the Professional Community - Recommended that AA's talk in person rather than videotaping their talks for use in treatment facilities; but that if videotapes are used, the anonymity traditions should be strictl maintained on such tapes.

Correctional Facilities - Recommended emphasizing cooperation with correctional administrations and courts, pre-release outside sponsorship, and referrals to AA meetings through local committees.

Grapevine - Recommended that AA Groups make every effort to introduce new-comers to the Grapevine as a tool for sobriety.

<u>Literature</u> - Recommended adoption and adaptation of a pamphlet from Great Britain, "A Newcomer Asks"; also approved the manuscript of the book, "Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers".

<u>Public Information</u> - Recommended that the film "AA - An Inside View" be released for general distribution to the public.

Report & Charter - Recommended that the "AA Service Manual" include additional material on the role of the Alternate at all levels of service.

Treatment Facilities - Encouraged the distribution of Guidelines for AA Members Employed in the Alcoholism Field in treatment, institutional, and other facilities where they apply.

<u>Trustees</u> - Recommended that owners or operators of treatment facilities not be excluded from serving on the General Service Board solely because of their occupations.

Conference Delegates in Northern California presently are appearing, upon request, to give a full report of Conference actions. If your Delegate has not made such report in your community, contact Naydene B, Modesto, or Lois J, Novato. Later this year the Final Conference Report will be available upon order from GSO (see your AA Literature Form).
