Banquet Hopes to Attract "Alcoholics With Assets"

A mayor will make the welcoming address. An Academy Award winner will be keynote speaker. A top-flight professional orchestra will play Anson Week's popular dance music, and a sumptuous dinner will be served in an historic dining room.

These are a few of the highlights that are expected to attract some 1000 AA members, spouses, and friends to the Tenth Annual Banquet and Dance Saturday, October 24, at 7:00 p.m. in the Garden Court of the Sheraton-Palace Hotel, San Francisco, held under the auspices of S. F. Inter-County Fellowship of alcoholics Anonymous.

KEYNOTER

Keynote speaker is a 63 year-old rugged character actor from the Beverly Hills AA Group who has won an "Oscar" for his outstanding performance in a famous motion picture.

Serious purpose behind the Society's sponsorship of a dress-up banquet in a ranking hotel is largely two-fold: First, it helps restore a sense of self-respect to members, who, through years of sometimes degrading drinking, have felt they'd rejected by society. Secondly, it tends become "outcasts" and otherwise re-to erase the skid-row, wino image which the term "alcoholic" sometimes conjures up, thus attracting "alcoholics with assets" who desperately need help.

"WINO" MINORITY

The secretary of S. F. Inter-County Fellowship, expanding upon this theory, said: "Only about three percent of California's alcoholics fall into a down-and-out category, or that of the skid-row habitue. Ninety percent are what we call 'alcoholics with assets'. These are potentially useful, productive people who could possibly find needed help which AA offers but who are fearful of becoming 'stigmatized' with the label 'alcoholic'.

Hopefully, these annual banquets

FRESNO READY FOR ASSEMBLY

In addition to a two-day calendar loaded with important business sessions including General Service assemblies, Hospital and Institution work shops, joint meeting of NCC and Group Secretaries, Alanon and Alateen sessions, plans have been made for diversified fun and entertainment.

General Service takes over at 9:45 a.m. with a "Sharing Session" with Bill G., and Rickey S., delegates of Panels One and Two, rendering reports.

At 3:00 p.m. Hospital and Institution meeting will be highlighted by guest speaker Walter T. Stone, deputy superintendent, California Conservation Center, Susanville.

A World Service Charter Sought by The Alanons

In the process of being chartered, the Alanons hope its World Service program will be a go through final chartering action and become a reality at the International AA Conference in Toronto in 1965, John F. of Santa Clara, announced.

Said he: "Like the AA General Service program which is chartered, the Alanons seek the same status, thus insuring the longevity of Alanon for the future to aid in the overall effort of Recovery, Unity, and Service."

ACTIVITY MAPPED

He cited that a year ago at the Berkeley AA Conference, the Northern California Al-Anon World Service Assembly was formed. He pointed out that since inception, this program—comparable to the AA General Service program in all respects—has held two assemblies; financed travel expense to send Delegate Ann O., San Jose, to the Annual New York Conference of Al-Anon; established a newsletter; and sponsored the appearance of Ann at four area meetings where she reported on the latest ideas and plans of Al-Anon on a nationwide basis.

She gave her most latest report at the Summer AA Conference in Dussmuir. Another highlight of Ann's report incorporated the fact that Al-Anon delegates from Canada, and representatives from Puerto Rico and England were in attendance at the '64 Annual Conference, John said.
