1500 Expected for Young Peoples Meet

Some 1500 or more young people will be in San Francisco July 6-8 to take part in the 16th Annual Conference of Young People in AA at the St. Francis Hotel.

Three day affair will begin at 10 a.m. Friday, and is themed "Getting Your Sobriety Together." The culmination of more than a year of effort by Bay Area YP members, this is the first time the annual gathering has been held in Northern California.

"From our involvement and commitment in this conference we have all become more active in all facets of AA activities," conference secretary Harriet T. told GOOD NEWS.

"This conference will certainly be the efforts of a group of men and women who have shared . . . and (hopefully) will help others to recover from alcoholism."

Preparations for the event have already resulted in the establishment of a number of new Young People's groups throughout the state. The sponsors hope the conference will help spread the AA message among a generation which is turning increasingly to alcohol and drugs, but has not been reached by the "establishment" AA groups.

Senate OK, Gov. Nix Seen For Gregorio Alcoholism Measure

The outlook for Senate passage of a bill greatly expanding the State's expenditures for alcoholism treatment were "very promising," but the Governor's veto was a strong possibility, an aide to Senator Arlen Gregorio told GOOD NEWS at press time last week.

The next step, as of that time, was consideration by the Senate Finance Committee, which administrative assistant Peter Herman hoped would get the bill within a week.

Herman anticipated little difficulty there, since the bill passed the Health and Welfare Committee by 8-1 after controversial proposals for funding through some \$70 million in increased liquor tax levies were dropped.

However, the modified proposal, drawing upon present excise taxes only, may still meet Gov. Reagan's opposition, he said. Excise taxes go into the State's general funds, and surpluses from these funds have already been earmarked by the Governor as tax rebates for the people.

Bill gave as his reason for resigning the fact that he anticipates having to move out of California in connection with his employment. He also stated that Anne S., Redding, who has served with him as Interior Area Assistant, had agreed to serve as Secretary for the balance of the term, which expires in the Spring of 1974, if requested. Anne was duly elected to the office by the assembled Group Delegates.

Bill has served A.A. long and well in many different ways. He has been General Service Delegate for the Northern California Coastal Area, and twice has been elected for two year terms as N.C.C. Secretary. He also has served the Surf Group of San Francisco quite a few years in several capacities, including Secretary.

Bill was accorded a standing ovation for his long service to A.A. in Northern California.

NCC Business Meeting At Richmond Makes No Change In Programing

It was noted that the next Conference will be in October at Santa Rosa, the March 1974 Conference at San Jose, with Eureka in June, 1974. A bid was received from Sacramento for the October, 1975, Conference, as they anticipate complete new facilities will be available by then.

After considerable discussion it was decided to make no definite change in the Conference program format. Requests for time on Conference programs will be considered as they are received, at the program committee meetings which are held about two weeks after each Conference.

After some discussion, the meeting voted to permit women AAs to go in to Soledad meetings.

While still maintaining our basic traditions, we can be a little more flexible where cooperation can gain us further opportunity to carry the AA message to the alcoholic who is confined. California Interior Area of General Service

The General Service Conference is a great deal more than the annual meeting of Conference delegates each April in New York City. The General Service Conference is, as it should be, in effect 365 days per year. A most vital role in the conference structure is the G.S.R., who has the job of linking his group with AA as a whole. He represents the conscience of his group, reporting the groups wishes to the committee member and to the delegate, so that it will be passed on to the Conference.

"This is a two-way street, allowing the G.S.R. to bring back to his group the problems and remedies that affect AA unity, health, and growth. To the extent that a G.S.R. keeps his group informed, then expresses the group conscience, only to the extent can the conference feel it is acting for AA as a whole. This becomes more evident each year — whether a G.S.R. speaks for a group of two or three, or for a 250 member group."

Tradition Two: "For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority — a loving God ad He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern."

Concept 1, of the Twelve Concepts For World Service is — "The final responsibility and ultimate authority for AA world services should always reside in the collective conscience of the whole Fellowship."

Responsible representation, informed group conscience, obedience to our spiritual principles, with communication the key are vital elements to insure our survival.

I need AA, you need AA, yet you and I are AA.

"The main principles of Tradition Two are crystal clear: the AA groups are to be the final authority; their leaders are entrusted with delegated responsibilities only.

The life of each individual and of each group is built around our Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions. (Continued on Page 6) GREGORIO (cont. from page 1)

"The Governor is just not in favor of raising the appropriation from that source for this purpose at this time," Herman explained.

Herman said the modified plan calls for appropriation of about \$12 million in calendar year 1974, \$23 million in 1975, and \$36 million in 1976 and thereafter.

The ammendments killing the liquor tax hike were proposed by San Francisco Senator Milton Marks and strongly backed by spokesmen for the alcoholic beverage industry.

Marks felt that new monies were not needed due to current general fund surpluses.

An even greater force for AA's unity is the compelling love that we have for our fellow members and for the principles upon which our lives today are founded.

Therefore we believe that we see in our Fellowship a spiritualized society characterized by enough enlightenment, enough responsibility and enough love of man and of God to insure that our democracy of world service will work under all conditions. We are confident that we can rely upon Tradition Two, our group conscience and its trusted servants. Hence it is with a sense of great security that we oldtimers have now fully vested in AA's General Service Conference the authority for giving shape - through the labors of its chosen Delegates, Trustees and service workers - to the destiny - that we trust God in His wisdom is holding in store for all of us."

Bernard B. Smith in his opening talk at the 1954 conference answered "Traditions and all of its services. We the question "Why do we need a need it to insure that changes within conference?"

"We may not need a General Service Conference to insure our" own recovery. We do need it to insure the recovery of the alcoholic

who still stumbles in the darkness one short block from this room. We need it to insure the recovery of a child being born tonight, destined to alcoholism. We need it to provide, in keeping with our Twelfth Step, a permanent haven for all alcoholics who, in the ages ahead, can find in AA that rebirth which brought us back to life.

We need it because we, more than all others, are conscious of the devastating effect of the human urge for human power and prestige which we must insure can never invade AA. We need it to insure against government, while insulating it against anarchy; we need it to protect AA, against disintegration while preventing over-ingegration.

AA. We need it ot insure against government, while insulating it against anarchy; we need it to protect AA, against disintegration while preventing overintegration. We need it so that Alcoholics Anonymous, and Alcoholics Anonymous alone, is the ultimate repository of its Twelve Steps, its Twelve Traditions and all of its services. We need it to insure that changes within AA come only as a response to the needs and the wants of all AA, and not of any few. We need it to insure that the doors of the halls of AA never have locks on them, so that all (Continued on Page 7)



So no matter how you look at it, B., 12 Stepping is a situation where, as they say in the old folk ballad, "Twa 'eeds Es Better'n Un."
