Most of us have spent years in our drinking careers pursuing a course of death and destruction. Now that we are in the A.A. program and working the Twelve Steps, let's go forward with a program of living. Nietzche said "A man who has a why to live can bear with almost any how." Sobriety furnishes the "why;" the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous, the Twelve Steps to recovery, and the one-to-one sharing at A.A. groups and through sponsorship provide the "how."

But have you let go? Are you living a life of fear and limitation because of a "sin" committed very long ago? A sin is nothing but a mistake, and everyone makes mistakes at some time. In making choices along the way, any decision made at a particular time no doubt was correct for that moment in time. There was a reason for choosing, you did the best you could under the circumstances, and if it was not the right decision, now you know. So breathe deeply, you are free, this is Today. Let go, let God, and live!

And Let Live! Some of us become so righteous and judgmental in our sobriety that it almost creates a feeling of alienation from others. Whether we voice our disapproval of others or just think it, it does not make for happy human relations. Many times such people also feel they cannot forgive or forget, and keep alive past hurts and resentments, which they seem to see reflected in other associates. Thomas Merton said "He that cannot forgive others breaks the bridge over which he must pass himself; for every man has need to be forgiven."

No matter how justified a person may feel in judging or condemning that which seems wrong to him, he cannot afford to continue in such a state of mind. As Bill said in the 12 X 12, "It is a spiritual axiom that every time we are disturbed, no matter what the cause, there is something wrong with us." The principles of tolerance and love have to be emphasized in actual practice. When we can accomplish this, the orthodox and the unorthodox mix happily and usefully together. We all are children of God, as we understand Him. Let us not be our brother's keeper, but rather our brother's brother.

### AN APPEAL TO THE OLD TIMERS - from "Mainstay," N.Z.

From observation of the various meetings that I have attended around Auckland, I am delighted to see many newcomers and people who are celebrating first and second and sometimes third birthdays. Many of the meetings seem to be made up of two-thirds of these people with from one month to three years sobriety.

However, as a "middle timer" i.e. over five years; I am worried by the all too few people of five years and over at meetings. You see, although it is wonder-

ful to see newcomers entering the fellowship, I need the fellowship as much as they do. Where are the older hands for me to need, to learn from, to be helped to reach ten years, to share changes that are happening in me? You see, I need to GROW in my sobriety - I cannot stand still, and to grow I must ask those older in sobriety to share their experience, strength and hope with me. I need them - and strangely enough the few that I have spoken to need ones like me. They want to be wanted. They want to feel that they have a place in this fellowship and that everything is not devoted to the newcomer. No matter how long I have been sober, now or in the future, I need this program; I need you older members to tell me how to go on living sober when sometimes the world's walls start to close in again.

For some reason when I entered the fellowship I believed that after a magic period (and I am not sure how long that was meant to be) I would find that I had no more problems, life would be serene and I would walk down the rose strewn pathway of life bestowing my serenity on those who asked. Life, in not one department, is like that for me and I sometimes think that I have a responsibility to say so simply because as a newcomer I did not understand that it would never be plain sailing all the way - ever, yet for a while as a newcomer I was led to believe that this would be so.

In closing, I would like to appeal again to the old timers and the old middle

timers who may read this but do not come to meetings any more. Please come back. I need you as do so many others. I love to see the new members coming in but I have been where they are. Where do I go from here? How do I grow into my teenage years in sobriety and beyond those? When I have feelings of searching for something more, who can I turn to if you are not around? Who is there to ask questions of like I used to when I first came to AA? Must I too drift away from the meetings because there are too few "elder statesmen" to turn to? You see if I do not grow in my sobriety, I believe I go. I have see those who have drunk after ten years and more. I do not want to do that. I all hungry to learn more for the older I am in AA the less I seem to know when I see how far stretches ahead of me. I still am a sufferer from this disease as we all are until the day we die. I still have more than half my life ahead of me, so old timers please come back and help those like me. I need your experience in living and what happens when those whom I sponsor one day turn to me and say "How do we handle this?" I need you to help me to help them. You wer

here when I first came into the fellowship - please don't desert me now.

If you don't believe this, consider the Group secretary, who learns how to do the job just about the time he (she) rotates out of the responsibility.

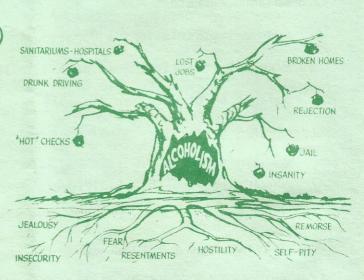

Plans now are finalized for California Northern Coastal Area's Pre-Conference Assembly, to be held Saturday, April 5, 1980, at the County Fairgrounds in Pleasanton. The program will consist mainly of discussion of the 1980 Agenda Topics, with an AA speaker meeting in the early eveing, featuring Sylvia M of El Cerrito. Facilities are available for a maximum of 400 people, to include

an evening potluck dinner. No registration fee is required for this Assembly, although Group contributions will be gladly accepted. Ample parking is available at the Fairgrounds. To reach the Fairgrounds, take Santa Rita Road off Highway 580 East, or the Bernal Avenue off ramp from Highway 680 South; or it can be reached by public transportation via Greyhound bus. Heading the host committee is Sam B, San Leandro, assisted by a housekeeping crew from Districts 750, Alameda County South. Registration will commence at

11 a.m. followed by a light lunch, a brief report from Area Officers, then an in-depth discussion of the Agenda Topics. These topics have been distributed to all Groups in January and February 1980.

This is the one Assembly each year where the Delegate stands mute, to listen and take notes of the Groups' conscience on subjects to be discussed at the 30th General Service Conference, which will be held the week of April 20-26, 1980, at the Hotel Roosevelt, New York City. All AA's, GSR's and DCM's are urged to attend and bring a friend.

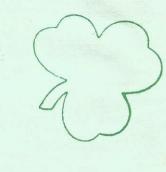
