It's been heard around the tables: "Just come to meetings, let it happen, you don't have to do anything. Easy Does It!" Perhaps it works that way for a very few of us; but for the majority, this program of sobriety means work, work, work. There's a sentence in the Big Book, after "The Promises", which many of us ignore: "They will always materialize if we work for them" - and that's not "Easy". This "Easy Does It" - what does it mean?

Remember, we're not going to solve all of our life's problems in one day. Loss of a job, a broken marriage, physical health problems, child custody, the big troubles, the bitter disappointments, the deep wrongs, the heart-breaking sorrows, tragedies of life - just let them go. Drop them softly, maybe, but surely. Put away all regrets and bitterness and let sorrow be only a softening influence. Easy Does It, and make the most of the future. We must work with what we have left, not what might have been!

There is almost nothing an individual can do to influence great events. We can't stop War. Bureaucracy and inept government are frustrations, but not within individual control. We may worry ourselves silly about being destroyed and the world with us, by The Bomb - but all that avails us is to make us sicker. Remember, we've already experienced our "worst day". Let's face it: We can't even manage our own lives. Let it all go, Easy Does It, and let's find the courage to change the things we can.

Albert Jay Nock, American essayist, put it succinctly: "The only thing that the physically human being can do to improve society is to present society with ONE IMPROVED UNIT. In a word, ages of experience testify that the only way society can be improved is by the individualist method which Jesus apparently regarded as the only one whereby the Kingdom of Heaven can be established; that is, the method of each One doing his very best to improve one (himself, herself)". This is precisely what the Twelve Steps to recovery are for. And remember, waiting is part of recovery. Easy Does It!

In Ecclesiastes we read: "To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven". There is a natural and sequential unfoldment of our experience. We grow in our awareness through patience. In this way we learn to appreciate and accept the good that is ours. We are only able to accept that of which we become aware. AA TAKES ITS INVENTORY

My first thought after I read the poem "What Did You Do Today?" in the December issue of the GOOD NEWS was the 1981 General Service Conference theme "AA Takes Its Inventory".

From the beginning I remember people telling me that it was a good idea to take a personal inventory, (4th Step). As I worked each step, I took another look into my inner self. Just to make sure I hadn't overlooked anything, it was suggested that I review my day. Step 10 suggests that I continue. So goes my inventory in Recovery.

It is also suggested that the group take a periodic look at themselves, to review the responsibilities of the group and to re-awaken and re-acquaint the group members with the Twelve Traditions. This is inventory in Unity.

The Calif. Northern Coastal Districts took a look at themselves, the purpose and responsibility of the GSR. Has the GSR been the link from the group to the wholes of AA; the courier of ideas and up-to-date information, the cornerstone of the structure and custodian of the Traditions? As the leaflet says, "GSR may be the most important job in AA". Our service inventory was most revealing.

Self-searching, self-examination, personality review, group scrutiny, job responsibilities or by any other name still means "taking an inventory". Whether it be in Recovery, Unity or Service, it takes courage and sometimes the results are painful. The fulfillment and reward of this painstaking experience is the knowledge of the direction we will be taking to correct our weaknesses.

This year the General Service Conference and AA as a whole will be taking an inventory. The list of agenda topics for the 31st annual (1981) meeting of the General Service Conference will be designed along that theme.

If Bill and Bob were here they would be proud that we are assuming the responsibilities they intrusted to us.

I am looking forward to this year with excitement and enthusiasm.

GRAPEVINE REPRESENTATIVE

For some four years now AA Groups and Districts have elected Grapevine Representatives (GVR's), and the resultant activity of the GVR's across the country has resulted in increased individual and Group subscriptions. This has been helpful to the AA newcomber as well as longtimers, since the AA Grapevine is a "meeting in print", and is one of the tools that we can take with us when we face that second moment of truth - that is, when we leave our AA Group meeting.

Many people have asked "What does a Grapevine Representative do?" The GVR's primary responsibility is to make sure Group members are aware of the magazine and the enhancements to sobriety it offers. Some AA Groups hold "Grapevine meetings" and in some cases "Grapevine Groups have been formed.

After a new GVR's name and address are sent to the AA Grapevine, Inc., each month he (she) will receive specially prepared material on the next issue, describing articles of particular interest. He may read excerpts from this in making announcements at meetings. Of course, he reads the magazine regularly, himself, and talks to other members informally about it. He encourages individual subscriptions, and particularly Group subscriptions in quantity for sale at meetings, or to give away, as the Group Conscience dictates.
