Last time this article was written for your Newsletter, I tried to answer the question I *always* get asked: "What is General Service, anyway??" The following two paragraphs were originally written for the Intergroup Newsletter last fall, but because so many members of Alcoholics Anonymous continue to ask what we do, I thought it might be good to start with them again:

"General Service is the link in the chain of communication between the Members of Alcoholics Anonymous and A.A. as a Whole. Alcoholics Anonymous has been called an upside-down organization because, the Groups are on top and the Trustees, at the bottom. Bill W. wrote in Concept I: "The A.A. groups today hold ultimate responsibility and final authority for our World Services..."\*(The A.A. Service Manual, pg.S15)

"All decisions made about Alcoholics Anonymous, whether it be our Literature or Policies, must come before the members of A.A.; therefore our Service Structure created what you might know as a General Service Representative or GSR. Your Home Groups have Service positions available for members to fill and represent *your* group at each of these entities:

H & I, InterGroup, BTG, PI/CPC, and hopefully, General Service (GSR). "

January is the start of a very lively time in General Service all around our Country! It's really neat to know that all of Alcoholics Anonymous is linked together during this time as we prepare for the Agenda Topics of 2008, and our GSR's all around the United States and Canada start collecting their Home Groups conscience, thoughts, and opinions. They'll all work very hard during this time to make sure what they report to their Delegates, is exactly what their Home Group Members want the General Service Conference to hear and think over, while making those all important decisions regarding AA as a whole!

#### In Remembrance of "Ebby" by Bill W. Copyright AA Grapevine, Inc, June 1966

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In his seventieth year, and on the twenty-first of March, my friend and sponsor "Ebby" passed beyond our sight and hearing.

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On a chill November afternoon in 1934 it was Ebby who had brought me the message that saved my life. Still more importantly, he was the bearer of the Grace and of the principles that shortly afterward led to my spiritual awakening. This was truly a call to new life in the Spirit. It was the kid of rebirth that has since become the most precious possession of each and all of us.

As I looked upon him where he lay in perfect repose, I was stirred by poignant memories of all the years I had known and loved him.

There were recollections of those joyous days in a Vermont boarding school. After the war years we were sometimes together, then drinking of course. Alcohol, we thought, was the solvent for all difficulties, a veritable elixir for good living.

Then there was that absurd episode of 1929. Ebby and I were on an all-night spree in Albany. Suddenly we remembered that a new airfield had been constructed in Vermont, on a pasture near my own home town. The opening day was close at hand. Then came the intoxicating thought: If only we could hire a plane we'd beat the opening by several days, thus making aviation history ourselves! Forthwith, Ebby routed a pilot friend out of bed, and for a stiff price we engaged him and his small craft. We sent the town fathers a wire announcing the time of our arrival. In midmorning, we took to the air, greatly elated — and very tight.

Somehow our rather tipsy

pilot set us down on the field. A large crowd, including the village band and a welcoming committee, lustily cheered his feat. The pilot then deplaned. But nothing else happened, nothing at all. The onlookers stood in puzzled silence. Where were Ebby and Bill? Then the horrible discovery was made— we were both slumped in the rear cockpit of the plane, completely passed out! Kind friends lifted us down and stood us upon the ground. Whereupon we history-makers fell flat on our faces. Ignominiously, we had to be carted away. The fiasco could not have been more appalling. We spent the next day shakily writing apologies.

Over the following five years, I seldom saw Ebby. But of course our drinking went on and on. In late 1934 I got a terrific jolt when I learned that Ebby was about to be locked up, this time in a state mental hospital.

Following a series of mad sprees, he had run his father's new Packard off the road and into the side of a dwelling, smashing right into it's kitchen, and just missing a terrified housewife. Thinking to ease this rather awkward situation, Ebby summoned his brightest smile and said," Well, my dear, how about a cup of coffee?"

Of course Ebby's lighthearted humor was quite lost on everyone concerned. Their patience worn thin, the town fathers yanked him into court. To all appearances, Ebby's final destination was the insane asylum. To me, this marked the end of the line for us both. Only a short time before, my physician, Dr. Silkworth, had felt obliged to tell Lois there was no hope of my recovery: that I, too would have to be confined, else, risk insanity of death.

But providence would have it otherwise. It was presently learned that Ebby had been paroled into the custody of friends who (for the time being) had achieved their sobriety in the Oxford Groups. They brought Ebby to New York where he fell under the benign influence of AA's great friend-to-be Dr. Sam Shoemaker, the rector of Calvary Episcopal Church. Much affected by Sam and the "Oxford Group" Ebby promptly sobered up. Hearing of my serious condition, he had straight-way come to our house in Brooklyn.

As I continued to recollect, the vision of Ebby looking at me across our kitchen table became wonderfully vivid. As most AA's know, he spoke to me of the release from hopelessness that had come to him (through the Oxford Groups) as the result of selfsurvey, restitution, outgoing helpfulness to others, and prayer. In short, he was proposing the attitudes and principles that I used later in developing AA's Twelve Steps to recovery.

It had happened, One alcoholic had effectively carried the message to another. Ebby had been enabled to bring me the gift of Grace because he could reach me at depth through the language of the heart. He had pushed ajar that great gate through which all in AA have since passed to find their freedom under God.

#### THE WILSON HOUSE

The Birthplace of WILLIAM GRIFFITH WIL-SON Village Street, East Dorset, Vermont 05253 802-362-5524

In 1846 this lot was vacant. Five years later the Barrows House opened as a hotel. When Bill Wilson was born here in 1895, his Grandmother Wilson owned the hotel, which had been in her family since it was built by her father. When she married Bill's grandfather, the hotel became <u>The Wilson House</u>.

Dr. Robert Smith and his wife Ann joined the Oxford Group where they talked about their prayer needs. Dr. Bob confessed that he was a silent drinker and couldn't stop and asked for prayers. Henrietta Seiberling was in that religious group as well and committed to pray for him. A friend, Bill W, came into town for a business venture that fell through, wanted to get drunk, and asked Henrietta if there was another drunk that he could talk to. His theory was that only another drunk could understand what he was going through and would help him maintain his sobriety. Ms. Seiberling got Dr. Bob and Bill together for a six hour meeting where they talked about the problems that they went through as a drunk. That meeting in 1935 led to Alcoholics Anonymous.

Dr. Bob's Home, in Akron Ohio, is where Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) all started in 1935. The purpose of AA is to help alcoholics gain and retain sobriety by sharing experiences, problems and hopes with one another. Dr. Bob and Bill W. worked with alcoholics one at a time to help them achieve sobriety in Dr. Bob's Home. Today the house is completely restored and welcomes visitors free of charge.
